
90% Diversion Rate by 2020

Increase Residential Recycling Rates



Both Single Family & Multifamily

City handles curbside, not apartments
15,264 mTons in 2014
Problems with Single Stream
Curbside Residential Recycling

Atlanta City Ordinance #130
Requiring Recycling at Multifamily passed in 2007

Has never been enforced

Increase landfill diversion to 90% by 2020



Divert MSW from landfills


2014 Trash: 106,319 Tons

Building material reuse

ACTIONS:

- Educate/Enforce Ordinance #130multifamily recycling required
- Partner with non-profits to education/implement recycling programs

Increase park land, greenspace, and tree canopy while assuring local food security



26,941 tons yard debris in 2014

Increase green space to 7%


Added Urban Ag Director


